It has been an absolute pleasure dealing with the Council, Mr Wayne Rademan and staff of Felixton College,' said 365 Solar Managing Director Mr Ed Selley.

'This project is a true success in every sense of the word!'

The School Council commenced the year with a much-needed strategy workshop where we reviewed and updated our strategic plan. This was an essential exercise, and we are already reaping the benefits of this process.

We fulfilled the promise made last year, to build a new Primary School - this was priority No.1 and I am sure that all of us are extremely proud of the magnificent, solid and purpose-built facility that has replaced the unsightly prefabs.

In addition, we have installed a state-of-the-art solar system which negates all the pain and inconvenience of loadshedding. At Felixton College, we now learn uninterrupted!

And just as important, we have not forgotten the littlies in Grade RRRR who will become our future High School learners. We have installed a brand-new classroom down at Roots and are happy that each age group is now well catered for.

All these projects have necessitated a capital spend of R20M (I can see accountants and the likes crunching numbers in their heads, relax, there's no need to, we've got this) and the reason we have been able to do this, is because our school numbers just continue to grow. Why? Because we are delivering an educational product which is seen as valuable and hence is sought after. This gives us that extra cash that makes these significant improvements possible.

But that's not all... as part of the strategic plan, we have engaged a team of architects who will take all the existing infrastructure and planned improvements into account, and who will draft a Master Plan (a model, a blueprint if you like) which will take us into the future.

The planned improvements include a full-size hockey Astro (apologies to the current Matric hockey players), a new school hall and a media centre. This will provide us with a roadmap for the College going forward into an exciting future.

None of this would have been possible without our major stakeholders, the parents. Let me take time to appreciate and thank the parent body for the unwavering support and the belief in the Felixton College brand. Siyabonga kakhulu.

So, in conclusion, I can confidently report that Felixton College is healthier than it has ever been, and looking forward, we can proudly say 'the best is yet to come'.



The PTA relies heavily on prize sponsorships and event ticket sales so that the money raised can go into the needs of the learners. Thank you to everyone who has supported us in any small way.


What I must commend is the commitment, time and sacrifice given by each of the PTA members who have served the College this year. Without them nothing would be possible.







IT'S ABOUT THE GAME WITHIN YOU

The next time you ponder the significance of school size in the sports arena, remember this: it's not about the size of the school in the game; it's about the size of the game within the school.

With only 221 learners from Grade 8-12 we have no right to be playing HSRB (970), Ashton Ballito (600), Empangeni High School (1300), Cornwall Hill College (1800), Hoerskool Monument (1600), Hoerskool Ermelo (750), Hillcrest High School (1020), Glenwood High School (1300), Oranje Mieseskool (750), or Howick High School (540). But despite us playing fixtures against schools much larger than us, we won or drew 55% of our fixtures this year with higher than 95% participation.

The following 2023 sporting highlights epitomise the culture of our learners

In the first term, our UI5 cricket boys travelled to Ballito to take on the much vaunted Ashton team. The atmosphere and vibe that they encountered as they took to the field gave them little hope against the Ashton UI5A team (they also fielded another UI5 team), with the most modern, immaculate training facilities and the player resources the envy of the smaller schools. Ashton batted first and scored 145 runs in the allotted 40 overs and expected a very short time in the field when Felixton went in to bat. Little did they know... our boys gritted their teeth and despite only having two wickets left, ground out the win with two overs to spare. Stars of the match were Levi Olivier who took 5 wickets for 22 runs and Veolan Palavar who scored 25 not out. The quality of hockey that our sportsmen and women produce (particularly when playing on astro) continues to amaze me as we dream of the day that we get our full-size astro! The highlights were the two wins against our derby rivals for our 1st boys (pre-season 3-1 and derby match 1-0). Overall we played 12 hockey matches versus our derby rivals, winning 7, drawing 3 and losing 2. We are definitely the real home of hockey in Zululand.

For the first time in many years, we took our 1st XV rugby boys on a pre-season tour to Hillcrest High

School. Apart from the on the field performances, it gave us the time to work on individual player weaknesses and this developed their game immensely.

Overall our U15 and 1st XV boys' rugby teams had a great season and the fixture versus Ashton at home was probably our best performance of the season, with both teams winning comfortably (1st XV won 34-8 and U15 won 41-5).

The sustained improvement of our netball players was clearly demonstrated in the IstVII results with three nail-biting losses against our strongest local schools showing how far our girls have come. The pre-season tour to Epworth saw them claim a comfortable win against Durban Girls!


The highlights of the third term, as our matriculants finish their sporting commitment, was a first-ever win for our 1st XI boys' soccer team against Empangeni High School.

Not to be out-shone, our 1st girls took third place at the annual Saints Soccer Challenge after victory against Eshowe High. The local schools all participate in the various 7-a-side rugby tournaments and as the Felixton tournament ended the season, it was apparent who the stronger teams were. Undaunted, and ensuring that no teams dodged each other due to the round-robin format, all teams play each other for the first time. Both our UI5 and UI8 boys' teams navigated their way to the final match having beaten all before them but lost the final game to be able to finish the 7's season as the second best teams in Zululand. This tournament also saw our UI5 girls play their first contact rugby! The performances above prove that our school clearly has "that game
